

CWO3 JHULEM B. EDEJER | USN

// Assistant Maintenance Officer

Warrant Jhulem B. Edejer was born to Lemon Brewer and Arnulfo Edejer and is a native of Olongapo City, Philippines. In September 2004, he entered the Navy and reported to Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes for basic training. Upon completion, he reported to Aviation Training Department (ATD) at Naval Air Technical Training Center, Pensacola, Florida for Airman Apprenticeship training.

In December 2004, he joined the "Blackhawks" of Helicopter Mine Countermeasures Squadron FIFTEEN (HM-15), NAS Corpus Christi, Texas. While onboard, he participated in various exercises, to include two deployments to Manama, Bahrain and various airborne countermeasure operations onboard USS BATAAN, USS BONHOMME RICHARD, USS TARAWA, and USS WASP in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom in 5th fleet AOR. He completed his tour as an AM2 and EAWS qualified with multiple recognitions.

In March 2010, he joined the "Warriors" of Marine Logistics Squadron TWO FOUR (MALS-24), MCBH Kaneohe, Hawaii. During his tour, he served as 51C Weld Shop LPO, and Aeronautical Welding Program Manager, providing "I" Level maintenance in support of COMPATRECONWING TWO, COMHSMWINGPAC, and 1st Marine Aircraft Wing (MAW) squadron operations. He completed his tour as a First Class Petty Officer and was recognized as Sailor of the Quarter for fiscal year 2011.

In July 2013, he joined the "Warhawks" of Strike Fighter Squadron NINE SEVEN (VFA-97), NAS Lemoore, California where he served as Airframes LPO, Phase Supervisor, Full Systems QAR, FCPOA Vice President, Command Fitness Leader, EAWS/ESWS Coordinator, Flight Deck/Line Coordinator, Maintenance Chief, and Safe For Flight. During this tour, he was instrumental in the completion of an aircraft transition from FA-18C to FA-18E, a Western Pacific (WESTPAC) deployment onboard USS JOHN C. STENNIS (CVN-74), and multiple detachments to Fallon, Nevada and Key West, Florida. His accomplishments led to his recognition as VFA-97 Senior Sailor of the Year, Carrier Airwing NINE (CVW-9) Shogun of the Year, and his selection as a CPO in September, 2017.

CWO3 Edejer then joined the "Shadowhawks" of Electronic Attack Squadron ONE FOUR ONE (VAQ-141), MCAS Iwakuni, Japan in February 2018. While onboard, he served as Quality Assurance Supervisor, Maintenance Supervisor, Aircraft Division LCPO, Detachment LCPO, Safe for Flight, and CPOA President. He completed three FDNF deployments onboard USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN-76) and numerous exercises. Additionally, he led multiple detachments to include Field Carrier Landing Practice (FCLP) Iwo To, and Electronic Warfare Advanced Readiness Program (EWARP) trans-pacific detachment from Iwakuni, Japan to Fallon, Nevada. Prior to transferring, he was selected for a commission through the Limited Duty/Chief Warrant Officer Program.

In May 2021, he reported to Airborne Command & Control and Logistic Wing (ACCLOGWING), NBVC Point Mugu, where he served as MQ-25 Stingray Fleet Integration Team (FIT West) Airframes advisor, MPA/MCI Inspector and Command Fitness Leader. While onboard, he participated in two Maintenance Program Assessments and three Material Condition Inspections for five VAW squadrons. He commissioned in February 2022 with follow-on orders to LDO/CWO Academy in February 2022 and Naval Aviation Maintenance Program Management Course in April 2022 where he graduated top of his class.

CWO3 then joined the "Cougars" of Electronic Attack Squadron ONE THREE NINE (VAQ-139), NAS Whidbey Island, Washington in May 2022 where he served as the Assistant Maintenance Officer after completing multiple key billets such as Material Control Officer, Quality Assurance Officer and Maintenance Material Control Officer. While onboard, he completed one deployment onboard USS NIMITZ (CVN-68), and multiple detachments to Fallon, Nevada and Lemoore, California.

Jhulem joined the Blue Angels in September 2025. His personal awards include the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (four), Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, and various unit and campaign awards.
